Sir, Melanie Phillips ("Raab can't make up the law as he goes along", Oct 19) describes the makings of a coup d'état by a government which seems not to know that the rule of law is the fundamental principle of the British constitution, on which the structure of our liberal democracy depends, Ignoring legal obligations and undermining the authority of the courts are classic first steps on the road to autocracy. It is the job of the law officers and parliament to act as the first line of defence against such a thing. When King James I tried it in the seventeenth century, Edward Coke and Francis Bacon, among other valiant MPs and law officers and judges, set him right.
